Y11/12 D&T Fashion and Textiles:

1. Sustainable Style - fashion garment made from 100% recycled materials.

This is your first practical project for your A level skills portfolio.

As a designer in the 21st Century we need to be aware of the global issues, ethical, moral and environmental, associated with the textile industry – including sustainability and recycling.

A number of you chose the sustainability context to explore for your GCSE NEA coursework so some of this will be familiar to you, however you will be expected to investigate the issues below in far more depth and detail. https://www.vogue.co.uk/article/has-fashion-finally-got-sustainable-2019 - PLEASE READ THIS FOR CONTEXT!

"In December 2018, while Greta Thunberg was telling the world's leaders at COP24 in Poland that "you are never too small to make a difference", Stella McCartney was launching the UN Sustainable Fashion Industry Charter for Climate. To mark Earth Day, Fashion Revolution announced that it too is declaring a climate emergency and has signed the charter. Other signatories include Burberry, Gap, H&M, Kering, Levi's and Inditex, all of whom have pledged to a series of industry-wide commitments, including a target of 30 per cent greenhouse gas emission reductions by 2030".

DESIGN CHALLENGE

Using 100% recycled materials (2/3 unwanted garments from home or a charity shop) you will create an entirely restyled single garment to demonstrate the values epitomised by World Earth Day. The garment should be fashionable and wearable. Decorative techniques such as patchwork, fabric manipulation, embroidery and applique could form an important part of your garment and design development.

This first project will last until the Autumn half term – approximately 24 hours, in school and for homework.



Holiday work:

- What is the UN Sustainable Fashion Industry Charter for Climate? What are the main points.
- What are the main issues facing the fashion industry today in terms of a sustainable future? Investigate the Fast Fashion industry what are the issues associated with this why is bad for the environment, is Fast Fashion a good business model? Consider how and why it evolved? Zara (part of Inditex) has pledged to support the sustainable fashion industry charter for climate, how will this affect their business model?
- What is Slow Fashion?
- Research the designer Stella McCartney how is she changing her brand to be more ethical and sustainable?
- Research fashion brand 'Junky Styling'

This transition work should be detailed, analytical and visual as well as well written. Use the textbook to help you – see below. You should present your work in a power point format similar to that completed for your NEA. You can upload this to your school personal folder the week we start back at school in September.
